

## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT AGM 2021

The year is finishing in much the same way as it started with the activities of us all still very much governed by the presence, or otherwise, of Covid. Although our Annual Reunion Dinner is held in October, preparations and planning would normally commence in March, but this year, right up until July, my repeated requests to Glenmore House for menu and wine choices, and significantly prices, were unable to be answered, if for no other reason, many of their foodstuff suppliers had either gone into administration or were unable to make deliveries. Additionally the restrictions that were just about to be lifted were still very fragile and subject to immediate change with little or no notice; in March, for instance, there would have to have been no queuing at the bar, table service only, masks on the moment you rose from your seat, no hugging, kissing, hand-shakes, singing or speeches....certainly not the joyous, care-free & happy occasion that we have come to expect at Reunion Dinners since the day that they first started and a dinner under those potential constraints would have been a misery. With deep regret, it **had** to be cancelled. BUT...Friday 7th October 2022 is very much on.

I will not say any more at this stage but leave it to Marc in his report at the AGM. Please, please get behind the School on this as initial quotes suggest that it could well be within our reach to achieve a wonderful outcome with relatively modest financial pain, if we can all manage to contribute just a little.
